MILITARY BUYER SUICIDES IN HOTEL

Woman Said to Be Member of Prominent Georgia Family

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Miss Ethel Tullin, 31, said to be a member of a prominent Georgia family, committed suicide in the hotel for the famous Memphis afternoon.

She shot herself through the heart with a small pistol she carried in her purse. A house officer discovered her body tonight.

Miss Tullin was military buyer for Casco Brothers, Birmingham, Ala. She had been at the hotel for a week. Her house physician said she complained that she was suffering from insomnia and he attributed this to the cause of her suicide.

On her dresser was found a purse containing a roll of bills and an empty envelope addressed to Mrs. M. J. Tullin, Carrollton, Ga.

On the bureau in Miss Tullin's room was an envelope which contained clippings from the Bible and prayer books relating to sleep. Coroner's Deputies said they believed Miss Tullin had tried to induce sleep by prayer and, failing, had called a physician who also failed to relieve her insomnia.

A brief note was found on the floor in which she had written "I am so tired; I cannot go another step!"

TWENTY MINERS DIE IN GAS EXPLOSION

Fatalities in Clearmont Shaft Greater Than Was Thought. Two Burned

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Feb. 6.—The death list in the gas explosion today at the Carlisle mine at Clearmont, near here, tonight jumped to 20. Earlier in the day it was thought that only seven had perished.

Thirteen additional bodies were found tonight in one of the compartments of the fifth entrance to the mine. Company officials insisted that with the exception of the 20 whose bodies have been found all of the 200 who were in the shaft at the time of the explosion escaped.

Examination of the last 13 bodies taken out of the mine showed that all but two of the men died from asphyxiation. Two burned to death. Pending official investigation mine inspectors would make no formal statement relative to the cause of the accident. It was generally accepted however that the earlier report, that use of an open lamp by a miner, was responsible. The mine has always been considered a highly gaseous one.

Harry S. Dickey of South Bend, Ind., who went to Santo Domingo to check up Director of public works John L. Mann's accounts said he saw Vick "outrageously drunk" more than once on the island.

Commissioner Phelan announced that the inquiry here would be resumed Monday afternoon and concluded Tuesday afternoon probably. The investigators expect to leave for Santo Domingo the next day.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Acting on a strong plea from Spanish Ambassador Riano, the State Department decided tonight to use its good influences with Carranza to obtain better treatment for foreign diplomats in Mexico City.

The ambassador told the department that since Carranza re-occupied the capital the diplomats have been subjected to various indignities and that unless conditions change within a few days many of them would leave Mexico. He has been unable to get into communication with the Spanish legation since Carranza was reported to have threatened to deport the minister, he said.

The defeat of the Carranzistas by Villistas at Villadamas was reported to the State Department tonight. Special Agent Sullivan wired that serious unrest prevails in the capital.

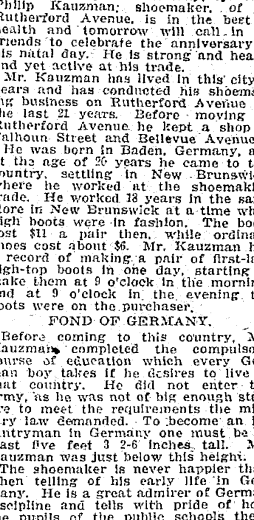

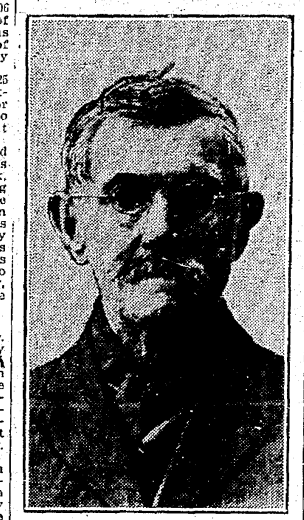
