Lippitt, Jr., and Miss Frances Lippitt, son and daughter of the bridegroom, and Mrs. George R. Senickson of Reading, Pa., elder daughter of Senator Lippitt. PULMOTOR REVIVES BABY BORN "DEAD". NEW YORK, April 27.—The unusual if not unique case of reviving a baby believed to have been born dead with oxygen and a pulmotor was reported yesterday by Dr. Louis Bernstein, of 874 Longwood Avenue, the Bronx, and Detective Harold Noar, of the headquarters staff, father of the infant. When the baby was born yesterday morning, under apparently normal conditions, her body was blue, there was no pulse and no respiration and Detective Noar at once informed Dr. Bernstein the infant was born dead. However, the father insisted upon every effort being made to resuscitate the infant.
