

NEWARK COLLEGE DENIED DEGREES
State Board Members Find Empty Bottles in School's Laboratory

The State Board of Education has refused to allow the New Jersey College of Chiropractic, of Newark, the privilege of granting degrees to its graduates. Under the law of 1912, the State Board of Education is charged with the responsibility of passing upon such institutions as apply for permission to grant degrees.

Such a request was received from the New Jersey College of Chiropractic, of Newark, and a committee of the board was named to investigate the standing and facilities of this institution. Mr. Rice, consisting of Dr. John S. Van Dyke, of Rutgers College, and Dr. Edgar H. Sturtevant, of Columbia University, reported at yesterday's meeting of the board. It was the opinion of the members of the committee that the permission of the board should be withheld "owing to insufficient equipment—financial, pedagogical and physical." The report of the committee was unanimously adopted.

The members of the committee supplemented their report by telling of their investigation of the school. In the room for the teaching of chemistry there were only a few empty bottles, but it was explained that this was to be further fitted out as a chemical laboratory.

The board decided to make a vigorous fight when the Legislature is reconvened in special session tomorrow to have an appropriation of \$1,750 made for the board. Mr. Rice, of the committee on normal schools, reported to the board that the Appropriations Committee of the Legislature had not seen fit to include the item of \$1,750 needed for practice teaching in the Newark Normal School. Mr. Rice explained that unless this money is forthcoming, 70 girls in the Newark school will be unable to get the practice teaching that is such an essential part of their training. The State board, if it does not get the money, will have to exclude at least 70 from the present class, and Mr. Rice said it was no pleasant task to tell what girls should not get this training.

The board named Mr. Rice as a committee of one to urge upon the Legislature the necessity of amending the appropriation bill so this money would be forthcoming. Regardless of the present intention of the Legislature to take up no bill but the constitutional election bill, Mr. Rice intends to make an earnest fight for the Newark students.

The term of Dr. William G. Schaufner, president of the board, will expire with the June meeting and at that time a new president will be chosen. There are now two possibilities spoken of to succeed Dr. Schaufner. They are former President Joseph S. Frelinghuysen, of Somerset, and Dr. Van Dyke. There is some doubt that Dr. Van Dyke will allow the use of his name, so it seems probable that Senator Frelinghuysen will be the next president of the board.

Thomas A. Kane, of 241 Bellevue Avenue, was held in \$5,400 bail on a charge of manslaughter. His automobile ran down and killed Nicholas Grieshab, eight years old, of 125 Trent Street.

Charles Tully, 19 years old, of Lambert Street, and Prof. Lourhilde, of 100 Hart Avenue, and Marcus Meyers, of Second Street, became tired of life and tried suicide, but without success.
