which is nearest to my heart—namely, the prevention of war.

It falls to your lot to speak officially for the nation. I consider it to be none the less my duty to endeavor as a private citizen to promote the peaceful solution of the problems arising out of the use of submarines against merchantmen, we find ourselves differing irreconcilably as to the methods which should be employed.

My dear Mr. Bryan: I accept your resignation only because you insist upon its acceptance, and accept it with much more than deep regret, with a feeling of personal sorrow for two years of close association which have been very delightful to me.

It is for these reasons my feeling about your retirement from the Secretaryship goes so much deeper than regret. I sincerely deplore it. Our objects are the same, and we ought to be able to work together in the same way.

That is what I hope to accomplish."
