MISSING ITALIAN WANTED FOR MURDER

Bought a Ticket For Bridge- ton It Is Thought.

Accused of Killing a Man in Philadelphia Yesterday After- noon—Captain Cameron Asks Detective Lore's Help.

Detective Frank J. Lore was last night requested by Captain Robert D. Cameron to be on the lookout for Joseph Scillig, who is wanted in Philadelphia on a charge of murder. Captain Cameron is at the head of the detective department and has about a hundred detectives under him.

As Mr. Lore got the story over the telephone the Italian is accused of killing a man in Philadelphia yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock and making good his escape.

It is thought the fellow bought a ticket to Bridgeton. It is known that he has a relative here by the name of Pasquino Iristiri (approximately) and a friend by the name of Matteo Corri. One, or perhaps both of these live on Clark street.

The description is that Joseph is about 40 years old, five feet, nine inches tall, weighs about 150 pounds, is rather stoutly built, has black hair and when he left a black mustache, a scar on his forehead and right wrist. He was wearing a dark suit with a light stripe and black and white cap. Mr. Lore will compensate anyone who gives him information leading to the capture of the man.

Constables L. D. Woodruff and Robert Y. Rath were on the lookout when the late train came in last night and were also watching the incoming trolley cars. A general search is being made for the Italian.

KILLS WIFE FROM AMBUSH

TRENTON, Feb. 4. While Mrs. Maria Fiorelli was on her way to work in a cigar factory her husband jumped out from behind an old boiler on Swan street and shot her to death. The man, Alipino Fiorelli, still is at large.

For a number of weeks the wife and husband have not been living together and the wife has been working in the cigar factory to support her two children. Fiorelli has been under arrest several times of late, once for shooting at some men who were annoying him and again for beating his wife. Last Saturday Fiorelli complained to the judge about his wife and said he wanted her arrested, as she was not true to him. The judge told him to go home and forget it, and no warrant was issued. As he walked out of the court the man said he would take the law in his own hands.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE TO VOTE TODAY ON IMMIGRATION BILL

The Question Is, Will It Be Passed Over President Wilson's Veto.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4. When the House of Representatives convened at 11 o'clock today one of the chief questions before it was how many members would be on hand at 5 p. m. About that hour the vote on passing the immigration bill over the President's veto is expected to take place, all of the intervening hours being spent in debate. The vote undoubtedly will be so close that the issue may be decided by the men who dodge it.

Representative Burnett, the author of the bill, declared he has six more votes than the needed two-thirds. The opponents declare that they have nine more than the necessary one-third.

JUSTICE BLACK TO PROBE WILDWOOD TROUBLE

TRENTON, Feb. 4. Supreme Court Justice Black today issued an order commanding James E. Whitesell, city clerk of Wildwood, to show cause before him on February 16th next, at the State House here, why a peremptory writ of mandamus or alternative should not be issued, commanding him to submit a recall petition that had been presented to him for the removal from office of William C. Hendee, Reuben Ryan and Frank E. Smith, comprising the City Commissioners of Wildwood.

Whitesell refused to honor the recall petition on the ground that after certain ward signers asked to have their names removed from the petition the remaining number did not form the required number of signers for recall proceedings. The Commissioners are charged with extravagance and inefficiency.

GERMANS VERY ACTIVE

PARIS, Feb. 4. Reinforced German armies are making violent attempts to take the offensive and force back the allies' line from the coast to Arras. Heavy cannonading around Neuport is reported in today's official dispatches. German gunners have resumed dropping shells across the allies' lines into Furnes. Near Notre Dame Lorette German infantry made an unsuccessful smash against the French trenches after several hours of artillery dueling.

DEATH IN FREIGHT TRAIN WRECK

RUSSIAN ADVANCE HALTED

LONDON, Feb. 4. The Russians have abandoned their march on Königsburg. For the past three days, no mention of progress of the campaign northeast of Insterburg has been contained in the official dispatches from Petrograd. Advice received here today said that the Czar's armies have encountered superior forces of the enemy west of Tilkallen and have been forced to halt their advance.

CHARGE AGAINST VAN HORNE KINKEAD RESIGNS FROM CONGRESS

JERSEY CITY, Feb. 4. Congressman Eugene F. Kinkead today resigned his seat in Congress. The resignation came after Kinkead, who is also sheriff of Hudson, had been informed by Congressman John L. Burnett, of Alabama, that he would challenge Kinkead's right to vote. Kinkead was about to leave for Washington last night. It was known that he also intended to vote to uphold President Wilson's veto on the immigration bill. Just before he was about to leave he received a letter from Burnett. He immediately changed his mind about going to Washington and instead sent his resignation to Governor Fielder, to take effect immediately.

MAY BE EXTRADITED

GIVES BLOOD FOR RELATIVE

ELIZABETH, Feb. 4. Daniel Paul Higgin, physical director of the Westfield Young Men's Club, insisted Monday night that a quantity of his blood be used in a last effort to save the life of his wife's sister, Miss Mary Holt, of this city. Three times the blood was taken from Higgin's right arm, and at the conclusion of the operation he protested against being kept in the hospital all night. At his place of business yesterday he declared that with the exception of a feeling of temporary weakness, he was none the worse for the experience. Miss Holt rallied almost immediately, and at the hospital it is believed she will recover.

BOLD ROBBERY OF JEWELRY STORE

Entered Before 10 O'clock Last Evening and Front Window Rifled

Store of E. H. Lewis, Right in City's Business Centre—Rear Shutter Pried Open Ap- parently With Ten Cent Hammer.

Between 6:15 and 10 o'clock last evening the jewelry store of E. H. Lewis was boldly robbed, the thief or thieves getting away with watches, bracelets, rings, etc., valued at about \$300.

The store is on South Laurel street and is just a few steps from the corner of Commerce and Laurel streets, the centre of the town. The robbery was not only pulled off before 10 o'clock, but the bulk of the booty was taken from the display window at the front of the store.

Articles Stolen.

So far Mr. Lewis has missed the following articles:
One bracelet watch valued at \$18.
Ladies' gold watch valued at \$15.
Four ladies' gold filled watches valued at \$15, \$14, \$12.50 and 8.
Three men's nickel watches valued at \$6 each.
Four bracelets valued at \$5 each.
Rings were taken by the tray full, there being nine trays emptied. The trays hold a dozen or more rings and the value ranged from \$1 to \$2.50 each. There were also about two dozen lodge charms taken valued at various prices.

The more expensive goods Mr. Lewis had put in his safe according to his usual custom and the most of the watches and rings were in the display window, the silverware, etc., being in the cases in the store. There were about eight of the \$5 bracelets left in the window.

Mr. Lewis found several articles on the floor where they had been dropped so it may be the thief or thieves were scared off and left in somewhat
